

Developing World Connections

In 2000, Kamloopsians Wayne McRann and Dan Miller were in the jungles of Guatemala, installing water systems and building houses on a Rotary International trip. They felt people other than Rotary members should have the same chance to do something to make others' lives better. Four years later Developing World Connections held their first meeting in Kamloops. On Dec. 26, 2004, a massive tsunami pounded 14 countries in and bordering on the Indian Ocean, killing 230,000 and destroying the lives of hundreds of thousands more. The horror of the devastation sparked Developing World Connections to life. With McRann as executive director, the first teams rushed to Sri Lanka to rebuild homes and community buildings. DWC has been on the ground ever since, first in Sri Lanka, then spreading to other parts of Southeast Asia, Africa and Latin/South America. Marking one decade in 2015, DWC has organized 200 trips and sent more than 2,000 volunteers to build homes, schools, training centers, latrines, water systems, computer labs to work on and other projects. Come and hear about this local success story and learn more about international volunteerism.
