

All classes have size limits. Classes may be cancelled if minimums are not met 10 days before start date.

To attend all KALS classes, inside and outside, you must be fully vaccinated against Covid 19. You will be required to show your vaccine passport and ID. For classes held at NSCC, wearing masks is mandatory in all areas of the building when not seated. KALS will follow all Provincial Health Officer rules and protocols and will adjust rules to comply when there are changes.

All classes have a minimum and maximum number of registrants. Classes with low enrollment are in danger of being cancelled. Maximum numbers have been reduced to ensure social distancing seating. Popular classes might have a wait list. Register early to avoid disappointment.

Parking at NSCC is at the back of the building in stalls on the north side that are marked "Community Centre & Moose Lodge Patron Parking Only.".

Do not park at the front in the roundabout and not in the fire lane in the roundabout as this area is designated for Cottonwood guests, care aids and the Moose bar staff.

At the back please do not park in any stalls on the north side parking lot facing the Christian school that are designated for numbered Cottonwood residences or stalls marked "staff parking only".

There is also parking on Cottonwood Ave.

Reduction Tech Offsets: Disrupting Climate Collapse

This technology uses oxidation, like nature, to reduce climate heating gases in the atmosphere. Viva will walk through the 4-billion-year-old oxidative system that came standard with the planet after the great oxygenation event from algae, then onto a relatively undisturbed pathway for this until modern man and combustion caused biomass destruction. Viva pioneered the idea of a hydroxyl dispersal to extend natural GHG removal with a simple technology that is being billed as globally scalable and cost effective. This will be introduced, along with the new developments that will help it succeed in mitigating worsening climate impacts.

Collective Memories-Japanese Canadians

Join the educator at the KMA to tour the current Collective Memories exhibition. Through the perspective, memories, and objects of the members of the Kamloops Japanese Canadian Association (KJCA), you will see the history of early settlement in the Kamloops region, the internment of Canadian citizens of Japanese heritage during World War II, the fight for redress, and the establishment of a cultural legacy that lives on today. One aspect of the display considers how sports can be a means of dealing with race and racial politics, the realities of everyday bigotry, and a way of accessing kinship for historically marginalized peoples. The tour invites participants to consider sports as a medium for thinking through race and politics, as they engage with the objects featured in the exhibition, including the history of the Vancouver Asahi baseball team. James Teit: An Extraordinary Person

James Teit was a Shetlander who came to British Columbia in 1884 to work on his uncle's farm at Spences Bridge. He soon tired of that and became involved with the local Nlaka'pamux people. His marriage to Lucy Antko in 1892 began a deep interest in the native world. He learned Interior First Nations languages and began collecting stories, songs, and artifacts for Franz Boas, an American anthropologist. Boas called him a "treasure." Among Teit's writings was a monograph on the Thompson published in 1900, followed by one on the Shuswap in 1909. He became an ally of the Interior nations, helping to take their grievances to the government. We would not have as much knowledge of First Nations history and culture of the Interior if it were not for Teit. Ken's presentation will tell the story of Teit's fascinating life through photographs and passages from his writings.

Hidden History of the BC Interior

Learn about the first 100 years of Indigenous/Settler relations in the Kamloops area between 1820 and 1920: Chief Nicola's unprecedented war against the Lillooet, which unified the Nlakap'mux, Secwepemc and Okanagan nations; Chief Spintlum's freeing of the slaves in 1850, which restored the Lillooet to Nicola's interior alliance; the Gold Rush; the devastating smallpox epidemics of the 1860s, and the amazing tale of John Freemont Smith, Canada's first (and perhaps only) black Indian Agent, who still has a building named after him on Victoria Street. All these things, and many more defining early moments in BC (and Canadian) history occurred within our immediate vicinity and resonate to this day. And yet we know only vaguely about a few of them. Here, Professor Jones shares some of the fascinating revelations of his readings through archival and historic material. Kamloops will never have seemed so exciting!

Pathways into Homelessness and Local Solutions

There are several pathways that lead people into homelessness. These include the lack of affordable housing, for renters; inadequate supports in the foster care system; and intergenerational trauma combined with cultural erasure that Indigenous peoples face as a legacy of colonization and the residential school system. Addressing these broader pathways into homelessness will require systemic and concrete changes by all levels of government. While housing and health care are under the jurisdiction of the province, there are things that can be done at the local level to help communities reduce and end homelessness. This presentation will start with a discussion on pathways into homelessness, before turning to promising practices and effective interventions and tools that municipalities and community partners can take to make a positive difference for the most vulnerable members of our community.

Heritage Railway Backshop Tour

Kamloops Heritage Railway's mission is to maintain railway history including steam locomotive 2141 and other rolling stock. KHRS Volunteers will walk you through the historic rolling stock and decommissioned cars and get you up close and personal with steam locomotive 2141, the last of its kind in Canada. You will hear the story behind the recovery of these historic transportation vehicles and be transported back to a time when a railway helped build a country. As this is an active industrial site, and due to Covid 19, the following guidelines are mandatory: everyone must wear closed-toed shoes, or you will not be permitted to enter the site, and masks are required for everyone within the enclosed space of a railcar. Then and Now: "A Journal of the Plague Year" by Daniel Defoe

The outbreak of bubonic plague in the city of London in 1665 took close to 100,000 lives in about 12 months. A Londoner, Daniel Defoe was only five years old at the time, and some sixty years later he researched and recorded the onset and progress of this catastrophic epidemic in his "A Journal of the Plague Year". We will read his "Journal "over several weeks, examining his experiences and his often-agonizing observations of the relentless advance of the disease. While Defoe is at heart a journalist it is not for nothing that he is called "the father of English fiction." The substance of his writing is nearly always the materials of real life, whether on a deserted island or in a plague-ridden city. But as a novelist his literary imagination probes behind the factual surface, bent on revealing how the beleaguered man or woman (or, in this case, a collective City) can confront and conquer the profoundest threats to life and identity. Our own still unresolved medical emergency has brought us to much the same place. Beyond its considerable value as history, Defoe's "Journal" has much to offer us as we seek to reflect on our own condition three and a half centuries later.

A Romanian Jew who moved to France in 1923 because of his love of French poetry, Fondane was both a poet and a philosopher. His philosophical thought brought him into debates with the leading French Marxists, Surrealists, existentialists, and Christians of his time.

Bruce's commitment to music education extended to all levels: he initiated the Primarily Music Series for young children from kindergarten to grade 3 and the Kamloops Symphony Music School.
