Tour of Walhachin – Gold Country's Ghost Town

The little town of Walhachin is perched on the south side of the Thompson River 65 km west of Kamloops. It has attracted attention for decades after it became a little community of the British aristocracy (in 1909) who imported their luxurious style of living to the dry interior of BC in the hopes of establishing lush orchards and agricultural lands. The dream was broken when most of the men of the town volunteered to serve in the First World War and there was no one left to maintain the infrastructure and manage the land. Bring your lunch and join us at the Walhachin museum to learn about the history of the town. Following the presentation, there will be a walking tour of the townsite (approx. 1 km). The cost of the tour includes dessert, tea, & coffee hosted by the Friends of Walhachin Society. The Corkscrew Road - Guided Walk with Ernie Kroeger

The Corkscrew Road is both real and imaginary: real because it once ran between Kamloops and Knutsford; imaginary because so much of it has disappeared. This guided walk will lead you to a few abandoned sections of the Corkscrew Road. Along the way, Ernie will share some of the stories and history he's discovered. Today the road exists in a strange limbo between remembering and forgetting, an in-between state that allows for both historic speculation and creative reconstruction.
