The Energy Transition - Is It Feasible?

The energy transition from fossil fuels to green electricity is a slow process, with most industrialized nations failing to meet CO2 reduction targets. Why? Politicians seem willing, public opinion is largely behind green initiatives, but CO2 emissions remain stubbornly high. Is it the inevitable fate of so-called intelligent, sentient beings to foul their own nest? This talk will explore some of the reasons that have led to our dependence on fossil fuels, such as industrialization starting in the late 19th century, population growth, increasingly sophisticated infrastructure, globalized food supply, and our inexorable desire to increase living standards and life expectancy. Such discussion and analysis do not make for catchy political slogans because they underscore our dependency on fossil fuels. Maintaining adequate nutrition for a growing population -- the absolute and first priority of organized, civil society -- requires increased use of fossil fuels, as well as expansion of green energy production. Living with climate disruption may be humankind's only option.

What Would Jane Austen Do? Reading "Pride & Prejudice"

Jane Austen's "Pride and Prejudice" has been the subject of a startling number of contemporary retellings–from the muchloved BBC miniseries, to modern versions such as "Bridget Jones's Diary", to the genre-bending "Pride and Prejudice and Zombies". By reading (or re-reading) Austen's original novel, we will delve into the reasons for its influence, as well as some of its complexities. How does Austen challenge ideas about marriage, even as she spins one of the most memorable romances in fiction? Why are her characters, almost without exception, deeply preoccupied with money? And how might Austen's observations about her world reveal new insights into our own?

The second session will delve into the sentence level approach to writing, useful for writing that extends beyond the essay.

For some philosophers, poets and novelists. creative writing and thinking are inseparable from walking; as they walked, so they thought.
