Wildlife in the City: Using Trail Cams to Monitor our Urban Wildlife

More than just a pretty picture! What can we learn about urban wildlife in Kamloops using trail cameras? Have you ever wondered what goes on in your back yard at night while you are sleeping? Sheri Watson took a sabbatical year in 2016 to gather information about urban wildlife within Kamloops using motion-triggered trail cameras. From 2016-2019, four times per year (Sept., Dec., Apr., Jun.), for a period of approximately 2 weeks, she set up cameras at various locations on the edges of Kamloops, including Westsyde, Aberdeen, Sahali and Rosehill, to collect images of wildlife. The images have since been used by students as part of a classroom exercise to investigate how urban wildlife species change over time and how deers' daily activity patterns change across seasons within the city.

Join us at the Kamloops Art Gallery for an interactive guided tour of the exhibition, Johnny Bandura: The 215, and engage in conversation with peers and KAG educators. Through 215 portraits, Johnny Bandura honours le Estcwicwelyl", the missing children whose graves were confirmed at the site of the former Kamloops Indian Residential School in May 2021, and imagines who the children may have become had they survived to adulthood. The faces are rendered in black and white to reference the absence of the children's lives, while splashes of color emphasize ornamentation and dress that imagine the children's futures. Some are depicted in traditional Indigenous regalia while others are painted in the clothing and uniforms of everyday occupations, including teachers, delivery drivers, office workers, and chefs. Others are celebrated as artists, musicians, mimes, and clowns. Johnny Bandura began painting these portraits as a therapeutic process. He felt compelled to respond to the findings as his grandmother was a Residential School survivor from Kamloops and Bandura remains connected to family in the region.

SPRING 2023 MULTI SESSION COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

Birding in Kamloops \$15

This class will be an introductory indoor session, followed by a field trip the following day. Birds we are likely to see will include local populations, as well as migrating species.
